Gadgets and tools

We all see many gadgets advertised that we are tempted enough to buy but then never use — usually because they solve problems we find we don't have! However we have put together here some examples of gadgets and tools which we do find useful. You may be aware of some of them but hopefully there will be at least a few that you may find appropriate and worth trying for yourself.

Auto wash stick (Creative Products, approx £10.00)



If, like me, you find it difficult to reach that section in the middle of the car roof when cleaning the car – then I have the solution for you. I purchased this gadget recently and haven't been tempted to use the (now very expensive) car wash since. No more rubber gloves and sponges – you simply insert the wash stick into a bucket of hot, soapy water and pull up the handle to draw the cleaning solution into the handle, where it is held automatically until released during use. The lambs-wool mitt then cleans the car very effectively. All you then have to do is to rinse the head and repeat with clean water to complete the process. Jenny.

Litter picker/Grabber/Handy Reacher (various



brand names; from approx £3 to £15 depending on strength needed for picking up different items)
A picker-upper tool, great for grabbing anything out of reach: getting to tight spaces

the hand/arm can't reach. A simple trigger on the handle operates the 'grab'. Morag.

Secateurs/tool sharpener (I have a Bosmere brand not available now, but Verdemax do a similar tool called 'Multi-functional sharpener 15cm'; approx £12)



so it's perfect for following the curve of my secateurs blade. It has a hand guard and also a tiny brush enclosed in the handle to brush off any shavings from the blade edge.

This sharpener is specially curved

It's never out of my trug! Lynne.

Spider catcher vacuum insect catcher



(Lakeland shown here, other brands available; approx £13) We have had a vacuum spider catcher in the house for years. The one we have has a tube extension and a little cap to put on the end (which keeps the 'catch' in instead of keeping the vacuum running). The vacuum means the insects/spiders are drawn towards it so they are much easier to catch! Lynne.

Window vac (Karcher are generally most recommended; approx £45 but depends on the model and if you buy some of the accessories)

This is such an efficient way of cleaning windows (and also shower screens, mirrors and tiles). You spray on water and the vacuum soaks it up without leaving any smears. You charge the battery electrically, and the charge will last half an hour but I find that more than enough time. The vac is incredibly light to handle and so quick to use — I can do any window or glass door in a minute or so without having to shift things out of the way or get messy myself. No going back to the old way for me. Lynne.



Touch screen pen/pencil/stylus (many brands, many stores, £2-3)

When holding my Tablet, I've never got the hang of 'double-thumbing' to use its keyboard when I want to write more than a



few words. The touch pencil I use has a rubber end to touch the screen. I find it so quick and accurate for the keys (also for the various icons). I find I even use it when I have both hands free. But you don't need to buy one if you have one of those pencils with a rubber on the end – just cut that in half and use the rubber part! Lynne.



Egg beater (many brands and in lots of antique/secondhand shops; approx £12 new) Sometimes the oldest solutions are still unmatched today. That's how I see my inherited Horlicks and Ovaltine Mixers, basically a jug and 'plunger' with holes and a long handle – so simple and quick to use and easy to clean. You can buy new whisks to the same design. Sadly, the secondhand ones are so popular now that they have become retro and barely cheaper than new ones. Still they are worth it: why would you use a whisk (not easy to dry completely when washed) or swivel your wrist when you could just push down with your hand? Lynne.

Home spun ideas

My three 'must have' gadgets are general common everyday items.

Old toothbrush for cleaning all narrow crevices around shower tray, baths, Hoover filters, around taps, etc.

Pegs for fastening 'open' boxes of cereals to keep them fresh, pegging jumpers/shirts up when changing stoma bags, and sealing opened packets of dried goods or frozen goods. **Elastic Bands** for wrapping around those packets of rice, dried fruit, nuts, cheese, opened frozen bags of vegetables, etc. – all those foods that normally have a sticky sealer strip that never seems to stick! Tip

Although we should routinely use the seat belts as fitted in our own cars, sometimes circumstances will apply which make the belts particularly uncomfortable as in Justine's case. This is her solution.

I suffered a rear-end shunt a few years ago which resulted in stomach bruising and I now use a Zuwit Bump Belt. It fastens around the bottom half of my driver's car seat and I guide my seatbelt through



the hook part. It simply takes the stomach part of my seatbelt further away from my stoma safely. It's really comfortable and I feel naked without it if I use another car!

I've road-tested other versions but the Zuwit brand suits me best as it's the quickest, easiest one I've used!



Recipe: Yoghurt Fridge Cream

There is just space here for Jenny's quick but delicious dessert recipe using just four ingredients.

This recipe must be prepared a day in advance. Serves 5–6. 10 fluid oz whipping cream 8 oz natural yoghurt

8 oz Muscavado brown sugar fresh fruit, raspberries, strawberries, etc





In a large bowl whip the cream to stiff peaks. Fold in the yoghurt.

Put the fruit in the bottom of a bowl and half fill the bowl with the cream mixture. Sprinkle with about one third of the sugar.

Spoon the remaining mixture over the sugar; then pile on the remaining sugar. Chill overnight in the refrigerator.

Decorate with fruit if desired. It tends to sink through though so only add it just before serving.
